One Tool Works Another

Our primary purpose is to carry the message to the compulsive overeater who still suffers, and that's exactly what the tool of service does.

OA has eight tools of recovery; a plan of eating, sponsorship, meetings, telephone, writing, literature, anonymity and service. Service is arguably the most important.

In the earliest days of AA, the fellowship grew because its founding members were desperate to help other addicts. They knew their own recovery depended on it. To stop the disease from talking to them, they had to talk to other alcoholics.

We have to hear our own story of compulsive overeating to remind us where we came from and to hear the hope of where we are now.

It's hard to work the tool of service without working another tool right along with it. If you are doing service by setting up a meeting, you are going to a meeting. If you are doing service by updating the phone list, you are making phone calls. If you are doing service by creating an article for the newsletter, you are writing.

When one tool makes you work another, it creates more momentum for your recovery. Service gets me to a meeting and out of the isolation of my disease.

Recently, after almost two years in program, I fell, inexplicably, into a depression. I felt so non-contributive that I avoided meetings and found every excuse not to be around people.

Unmotivated and feeling let down both at home and at work, I wondered whether I was having a nervous breakdown. I wasn't able to tell anyone, and I even left a couple of meetings and cried --- not because the people weren't wonderful but because I felt so rotten inside. I had the awful fear that if I laid my

problem on the group or an individual member, I would spread the depression. The result was, I simply could not express my feelings to anyone, not even the people I know love and care for me.

For the past few days I have been reading OA literature --- all I could get my hands on --- and this has guided me back to sanity. God does speak to us, if we listen. In each piece I read, I found something I could pull out and hang onto.

I have come to understand that hanging on is the important thing; we fail only when we stop trying. For each of us, there are hills to scale and valleys to pass through in this program, and in life. But we are not alone. H.P. can and will handle all problems, and show us what we need.

After making a mess of things, I've decided to let go and let God clear it all up. And God is doing it --- beautifully.
